'Be alert' for ID thieves

"Be alert" – that was the advice of Linda Hatfield at our March 14 meeting against identity thieves. "With the current economy, it's worse for ID theft." She added that senior citizens are especially vulnerable. Linda is the



marketing VP for Birmingham-Bloomfield Credit Union (and the guest of NANCY PETSCH, who manages the Keego Harbor branch.) ID theft occurs

when someone wrongfully acquires and uses another person's personal information, credit or other account iinformation. The thief may use this information to obtain credit or make purchases, or to gain access to the victim's bank account. Victims can lose employment opportunities, Social Security benefits, work time and money. The key to preventing becoming a victim of ID theft to is to monitor your accounts and to understand your credit reports. (NOTE: In future issues of this newsletter, we'll share some of the information Linda gave us about how to protect against ID theft, and what to do if you are a victim.)

Abbott jazz band a treat

Our March 28 meeting was a special treat for the members as the Abbott School Jazz Band entertained us with about a half-hour program of jazz and rock 'n' roll.
