SCHOLARSHIPS: \$4,500 this year, \$33,650 to 43 students in 9 years

Our Club has awarded scholarships totaling \$3,500 to five West Bloomfield High School graduates. In addition, a \$1,000 scholarship awarded in 2003 has been claimed to raise Our Club's awards for the 2006-07 Optimist Year to \$4,500. The students were introduced at the annual Michigan Week Breakfast May 18 at Shenandoah Country Club.

Since 1999, Our Club has awarded \$33,650 in scholarships to 43 students.

Austin Fletcher – \$500 . . . A student of West Bloomfield High School, Austin hopes to go into engineering with a special interest in robotics. He has been active in the Oakland County Competitive Robotics Association and values "hard work and determination". He has been accepted at Michigan State, Michigan Tech and Western Michigan University.

Jane Hwang – \$500 . . . A student of West Bloomfield High School, Jane aspires to become a dentist. Jane's teachers speak exuberantly of her responsible and positive attitude, and her GPA of 3.9 proves that it has paid off – all in a language and culture new to her! She is actively involved with her church and has helped out at Korean School as a substitute teacher. Jane has been accepted at Michigan State University.

Giovanni Santia – the Ledge Tomlinson \$1,000

Scholarship . . . A student of West Bloomfield High School, Giovanni is looking at astrophysics as his field of study. A 3.95 GPA and recipient of the Michigan Math Scholar Award are only two of his

Magnet program attracts exceptional kids from all over the WB District

West Bloomfield's Magnet Program is aptly named: it attracts academically exceptional children from all over the district to Roosevelt school in Keego Harbor, where it has been located since its founding in the 1978-79 school year.



Roosevelt principal, STEVE PALMER, introduced Kristi Law, one of the four members of the Magnet faculty, at our May 23 meeting. She explained that the program is

limited to 100 students, in grades 3-5, who are nominated by parents and teachers and then accepted on the basis of written narratives and questionnaires.

The three-year curriculum covers courses in science, social studies, math and language arts. Students are encouraged through project-based learning to reach their highest potential. The guiding principles of the Magnet program are:

- Lifelong learners: Through mentally-challenging projects, simulations, explorations and discussions, students begin to understand the excitement of creative problem-solving and critical thinking, factors that continue on with them in their life careers.
- Project-based: Students are actively involved in their learning through projects that are team initiatives or individualized studies, giving them the freedom and ability to pursue and explore their own talents and interests.
- Relationships: Students connect intellectually with same-age peers, who often become lifelong friends in many instances, while teachers come to fully understand students' strengths and weaknesses.
- Multi-age: Working and playing together in an all-day, every-day program, students from the third, fourth and fifth grades learn to appreciate and respect differences in ability rather than using age and gender as dividing factors.
- Intellectually exceptional children: Such children learn in ways that are different from other students. They yearn to learn broader and deeper, and faster and sooner. Students receive a curriculum that allows them to be challenged at their intellectual level, and to work and learn with other students with exceptional talents.

'Be alert' for ID thieves

Identity Theft occurs when someone (the "perpetrator") wrongfully acquires and uses a consumer's personal identification, credit or other account information. The



perpetrator may use this information to obtain money, credit, goods, services and other things of value in the victim's name. The perpetrator may also use

this information to gain access to the victim's bank accounts.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A VICTIM:

- Report to police immediately. Ask the police to issue a police report.
- Call the fraud units of the three major credit reporting agencies.
- Request that a fraud alert be placed in your file.
- Request that a victim's statement be added to your file.
- Request a copy of your credit report. Check each credit report carefully.
- Request each credit reporting agency to remove all erroneous information. Ask each credit reporting agency to wend you a copy of the corrected credit report.
- Call each affected credit card issuer to close and reissue all affected accounts.
- Ask each credit card issuer about the status of your account. Instruct the issuer not to honor any requests for information changes.
- Close and reissue any affected checking and savings accounts,. Ask the financial institution to attach a unique identifier to your accounts.
- Get a new ATM card and PIN.
- Contact the Department of Motor Vehicles of you suspect someone is using your driver's license number.
- Contact the Social security Administration if your social security number has become associated with bad checks and credit. Call 800-772-1213 to check your Social Security Statement.
- Notify the Postal Inspector if you suspect your mail has been stolen or a fraudulent change of address has been filed in your name.
