(continued from page 1) GIRLS: Under 10, under 12, under 14,

under 16, under 18.

**MEN**: Open/Elite, Men over 35, recreational A & B. No "carded" players are allowed in the "over 35" and "rec" divisions. Those players should opt for the "open/elite" division.

WOMEN: Open Division /Rec.

There will be a maximum of six teams per division. Jerseys will be provided bearing the names of the Original Six NHL teams: Red Wings, Blackhawks, Maple Leafs, Canadiens, Bruins and Rangers. Teams will be guaranteed at least three games.

The cost is \$400 per 6-member team (5 skaters and a goalie). The teams will be confirmed on a first-come, first served basis. (Please make checks payable to Keego Harbor Optimist Club). This is a USA Hockeysanctioned event.
