Agency provides services to the deaf

APRIL 26 – More than a quarter-century ago, there was a need to provide services to the deaf community in this corner of southeastern Michigan. Studies showed that the area between Flint and Detroit had the highest concentration of deaf people.

The answer came in the formation of the Deaf Community Advocacy Network (DEAF C.A.N.) in 1981.



Its director since 1983, Marcy Colton, provided an insight into the important work of the agency. Among the facets of its varied programs are:

- Youth Leadership: outings, a lounge for socializing and help with homework, a summer camp, etc.
- Case work: Marcy spotlighted the assistance that deaf students require and the shortfall that they receive in the educational system. "We need better opportunities for the deaf students because they can't compete later in life. It's a serious issue."
- Sign language interpreting: More than 12,000 hours a year are spent by staff and volunteers to help the deaf in the doctor's office or the courthouse or in just about any everyday situation.

The literature that Marcy left for us was impressively chock-full of a wide range of activities for the deaf provided by (DEAF C.A.N.). So interesting and informative was her presentation that we invited her back in the near future to tell us more.
