Michigan Masons offer child ID kits

Michigan Masons provide one of the most complete child recovery and identification programs in the nation. Dubbed Michigan CHIP (**CH**ild Identification **P**rogram), the free service provides a number of identifying items which are given to the child's family. Doug Garceau, a self-employed custom carpenter in the eego and a member of the Masons, related the rogram to be a few to the child's family. The ID traits that the HIP covers include dental impressions, DNA (saliva), color photo, fingerprints and a brief videotaped interview that can be quickly distributed to the media to reach a large audience. The CHIP program is usually held in schools, shopping malls, county fairs, etc. For more information, call 1-800-632-8764.

501 (c)(3) Update: 10 to go

Members of the Optimist International staff and the OI attorney had a conference call recently with the IRS. The IRS is asking for additional information from 10 Clubs. International (as of early October) had not received the names of the Clubs. When OI receives the names and the questions, staff will immediately inform the Clubs, the Lieutenant Governors in their Zone, and the local District Governors. The organization will have 30 days to respond to the IRS, but hopes to have the information sooner. **NOTE**: Our Club is NOT among the 10 from whom the IRS is requesting additional information. We filed our report a long, long time ago.
